- •Take blocks or rows to a Project Linus chapter near you and help sew them into quilts on Make-A-Blanket Day, February 16, 2008.
- •Make a quilt and send it to a Project Linus chapter or to us by March 30, 2008 for local distribution.

## materials

**Assorted Yellows, Blues, Greens and Purples/Pinks** (see Step 1)

1/3 yard total from each color group for blocks

#### Multiprint #1

1/2 yard for blocks

#### **Purple Tone-on-Tone**

1/3 yard for border #1

#### Multiprint #2

11/8 yards for border #2 and binding

Backing 11/4 yards

**Batting** 40" x 40"

# cutting

#### **Purple Tone-on-Tone**

for border #1

- 2 strips 11/2" x 27" for sides
- 2 strips 11/2" x 29" for top/bottom

#### Multiprint #2

for border #2

- 2 strips 51/2" x 29" for sides
- 2 strips 51/2" x 39" for top/bottom
- 5 strips 21/4" x 40" for binding

#### Backing

1 panel 40" x 40"

#### **1** About This Quilt

This versatile Log Cabin block offers many layout possibilities. Have fun trying different arrangements with your own blocks. We used 5 different tone-on-tones from each color group for our quilt.

Our readers have requested a version of our Project Linus patterns without foundations, and we've listened! Find a pieced variation of this block on our website at **quiltmaker.com/webextras**. Please use the foundation-pieced pattern for rows sent to *QUILTMAKER* so the blocks are a consistent size.

#### Making the Top

Make 16 paper copies of the foundation found on the next page. In numerical order, foundation piece a block W, randomly placing purple and pink fabrics in patches #1–#5 and placing the multiprint in patch #6. Press and trim after each patch addition. Make 4 block W's.

Make 4 block X's using the assorted yellows, 4 block Y's using the assorted blues and 4 block Z's using the assorted greens, with the multiprint in patch #6 for all of the blocks.



Efficient Foundations. To make the blocks efficiently, you can precut oversized patches before you begin to sew. Start by adding ½" to each side of the foundation patches. Use these measurements to cut strips from each fabric, and then cut the patches from the strips.


Join the blocks to make the rows as shown. Sew the rows together. Remove the foundation papers.



Sew the border #1 side strips to the quilt and trim any extra length. Add the border #1 top and bottom strips in the same way. Repeat to add border #2.


### Z Quilting and Finishing

Use a small plate to mark connecting arcs in the blocks and borders as shown on the next page. Layer and baste together the backing, batting and quilt



Pattern is the reverse of the finished block.

top. Quilt the rows in the ditch, extending the quilting lines into the borders as shown. Quilt the marked arcs. Bind the quilt. ■
